
Queen's Park notes Update - February 21 - March 24, 2023

43RD PARLIAMENT – SPRING SESSION

The 43rd Parliament began on August 8, 2022. February 21, 2023, marked the beginning of the Spring Session and, although spring seems to be a long way off, the Ford government wasted no time introducing a substantial amount of new legislation, including tabling their budget on Thursday, March 23, 2023. Every person living and working in Ontario will be impacted, directly or indirectly, by these proposed bills.

BILL 79, WORKING FOR WORKERS ACT

Government Bill

This Act would amend various statutes with respect to employment and labour and other matters, including but not limited to the Occupational Health and Safety Act, Employment Standards Act, and the Ministry of Training, Colleges, and Universities Act.

BILL 78, GROUP OF SEVEN DAY ACT

BILL 76, RESPECTING WORKERS IN HEALTH CARE AND IN RELATED FIELDS ACT

If enacted this Bill would increase the minimum wage for, sick leave, and access to health benefits and pensions for personal support workers, homemakers and workers in certain health care settings.

BILL 74, MISSING PERSONS AMENDMENT ACT

BILL 73, SUPPORTING ONTARIO'S COMMUNITY, RURAL AND AGRICULTURAL NEWSPAPERS ACT

Stéphane Sarrazin (Glengarry—Prescott—Russell)

This bill would change the definition of a newspaper in various acts to require that notices be published in a newspaper having general circulation in a municipality. The amendments allow the publication to be done in a newspaper that is published at regular intervals of a month or less, rather than published at regular intervals of a week or less, as is currently the case.

BILL 72, HEALTH PROFESSIONALS' WEEK ACT

BILL 67, TEMPORARY NURSING AGENCY LICENSING AND REGULATION ACT

Private Members' Bill – Ontario Liberal Party Adil Shamji (Don Valley East)

This bill seeks to create new licensing requirement for operators of temporary nursing agencies. Applications for these licences must be submitted to the Registrar appointed under the Act. The applications must contain a credentialling and monitoring plan as well as a compliance plan. Contravention of the Act or the regulations is an offence and is punishable on conviction by a fine.

BILL 66, HEART VALVE DISEASE AWARENESS ACT

This bill would declare February 22 in each year as Chosen Family Day.



NEW BILLS INTRODUCED (CONTINUED)

BILL 61, MAKING PSYCHOTHERAPY SERVICES TAX-FREE ACT

If enacted, the bill would require the Minister of Health to take all necessary steps, including introducing legislation, if necessary, to ensure that the tax treatment of psychotherapy services provided in Ontario by psychotherapists, registered psychotherapists and registered mental health therapists within the meaning of the Psychotherapy Act, 2007 is the same as the tax treatment of those services provided by other practitioners.

BILLS REFERRED TO COMMITTEE

BILL 75, QUEEN'S PARK RESTORATION ACT

Standing Committee on Procedure and House Affairs Government Bill

Hon. Paul Calandra (Markham—Stouffville) Minister of Legislative Affairs This bill would establish a new ministry, to be known as the Queen's Park Restoration Secretariat. The ministry would oversee the renovation/restoration of the 130 year old Ontario Legislature. The project is expected to cost well over \$1 billion and take years to complete. A temporary location has yet to be determined.

BILL 71, BUILDING MORE MINES ACT

Standing Committee on the Interior Government Bill Hon. George Pirie (Timmins) - Minister of Mines

This bill would, amongst other things, make it easier for companies to get permits to open mines faster, mine metals from tailings and waste, and transfer more authority to the Minister.

BILL 70, SENIORS MONTH

Standing Committee on Social Policy Private Members' Bill - PC Dawn Gallagher Murphy (Newmarket-Aurora)

BILL 69, REDUCING INEFFICIENCIES ACT (INFRASTRUCTURE STATUTE LAW AMENDMENTS)

Standing Committee on Heritage, Infrastructure and Cultural Policy Government Bill

Hon. Kinga Surma (Etobicoke Centre)

If enacted, Bill 69 would impact eleven (11) other acts in two ways – real estate management and maintenance, and environmental assessment requirements.

This act would alter the way the government maintains and manages Ontario's real estate portfolio for fourteen (14) government councils/corporations including (EQAO), Higher Education Quality Council of Ontario (HEQCO), and Skilled Trades Ontario.

In addition, if passed, this act would alter the Environmental Assessment Act by granting the Minister of Environment, Conservation and Parks the ability to waive or alter the 30-day review period between when a class environmental assessment is completed and when a when a proponent may begin a project.

BILL 60, YOUR HEALTH ACT

Standing Committee on Social Policy Government Bill

Hon. Sylvia Jones (Dufferin—Caledon)

If passed this bill would amend and enact various Acts with respect to the health system and have ramifications on the entire Ontario health care system, including the increase in private, for-profit, surgeries and procedures.

BILL 63, ST. THOMAS - CENTRAL ELGIN BOUNDARY ADJUSTMENT ACT

Government Bill

Hon. Steve Clark (Leeds—Grenville—Thousand Islands and Rideau Lakes) -

Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing

The bill allows for the annexation of a portion of the Municipality of Central Elgin to the City of St. Thomas. Various matters are dealt with, including the application of by-laws, resolutions and official plans, the continuation of procedures in process and arrangements with respect to real property taxes.

BILLS DEFEATED

BILL 62, FARMLAND AND ARABLE LAND STRATEGY ACT

Private Members' Bill – Independent Bobbi-Ann Brady (Haldimand-Norfolk) Defeated - Second Reading - Ayes 29; Nays 68

BILL 50, BUILDING BETTER BUSINESS OUTCOMES ACT

Private Members' Bill - OLP

Stephanie Bowman (Don Valley West)

This bill would have required publicly traded companies to disclose how they recruit board candidates belonging to one or more of the following groups: women, persons who are Black, Indigenous or racialized, persons with disabilities and persons who are LGBTQ+. Defeated - Second Reading - Ayes 35; Nays 75

BILL 47, PROTECTING HUMAN RIGHTS IN AN EMERGENCY ACT (EMERGENCY POWER GENERATORS)

Private Members' Bill - ONDP Chandra Pasma (Ottawa West-Nepean) – Critic, Education Jessica Bell (University-Rosedale) - Critic, Housing Kristyn Wong-Tam (Toronto Centre) - Critic, 2SLGBTQ+ Issues, Critic, Attorney General Bhutila Karpoche (Parkdale-High Park) - Critic, Early Childhood Development, Critic, GTA Issues



BILLS DEFEATED (CONTINUED)

Critic, Child Care

The bill sought to amend the Residential Tenancies Act, 2006 and the Condominium Act, 1998 to require landlords and corporations, respectively, to ensure buildings have emergency power generators.

Defeated. Second Reading (Ayes 30; Nays 66)
